t's hard to visualize it now, but not too long ago, Wailea and Makena were part of a prolific dryland forest. A dryland forest is one that receives less than 50 inches of rainfall annually. These forests are primarily found on the leeward coasts of our islands. More than 40 native plant species grow in these dryland forests and more than 25% of Hawai'i's endangered plants are found therein. Roughly 95% of these forests have been destroyed through commercial, residential and agricultural development, as well as weeds, fire, introduced animals and diseases.

Dryland forests are important to Hawai'i's ecosystem. They limit water and wind erosion, helping to maintain and promote healthy soils. Dryland forests are the exclusive home of many of Hawai'i's endangered plants and birds. By preserving native species and increasing the genetic diversity of our landscapes, we provide more possibilities for the evolution of plants and animals to thrive in future environments.

3 Natives For Your Outdoor Space:



Wili wili (Erythrina sandwicensis), known for its brilliant flowers, cherryred seeds, and buoyant wood, was once a popular material used for surfboards. Wili wili grows 15-30 feet tall and is a deciduous tree – a rarity among Hawaiian plants. During summer, they erupt with fiery orange,

chartreuse, or pale yellow blossoms, while in autumn, the flowers give way to seedpods that bear deep red and scarlet colored seeds prized by lei makers. This tree can go for long stretches of time with minimal water—it hibernates during the hottest months, when its leaves vanish and its trunk shrinks. The trunk then swells and flushes with leaves when rain returns.





Ko'oloa'ula (Abutilon menziesii), also referred to as Red 'Ilima, is listed on the federal list of endangered species. This threatened plant is a relative of hibiscus, 'ilima and ma'o. It is a spreading shrub with heart-shaped, silky, serrated, silver-green leaves and pink to burgundy dangling flowers with

yellow stamens that are beautiful in leis. The leaves are said to flutter their hula in the wind. The roots have nitrogen-fixing capabilities, which enables plants to flourish in nutrient-depleted soils. This plant is easy to grow, is drought tolerant, thrives with little water, and tolerates pruning to shape, sprouting new growth rapidly.



'Ihi (Portulaca molokiniensis) is an attractive relative of purslane that grows upright, 12 to 18 inches tall, and is only found naturally on Molokini and Kaho'olawe. In full sunlight, its stems grow to the thickness of a cigar. The thick, rounded leaves grow in a column-like pattern at the top of

the stem with delightful, yellow cup-shaped flowers rising from the center. This plant thrives in full sun and prefers well-drained, sandy soil to prevent rot, much like a cactus. It needs little water and will survive in any dry soil, making it ideal for xeriscape gardens. It works well as a specimen plant nestled among lava rocks and mulched with cinder. It will also live for a long time in clay, ceramic or cement pots-perfect for a sunny lanai.

A good pair of binoculars should allow you to see Jupiter's four largest moons, appearing as bright dots on either side of the planet.

A total solar eclipse occurs when the moon completely blocks the sun, revealing the sun's beautiful outer atmosphere known as the corona.

The path of totality will only be visible in parts of central Indonesia and the Pacific Ocean. Totality will last 4 minutes and 9 seconds, occurring at 4pm.



NEIGHBORS OF Wailea & Makena

he south shore of Maui was largely untouched when Brian Rigney first arrived on a one-way ticket in 1985. Acres of kiawe and patches of cacti thirsty for rain flanked the rugged dirt road that led to La Perouse, those on their last two bucks of gas coasting it from The Prince and over the Makena Bumps to Big Beach. What's now The Shops at Wailea offered little more than Ed & Don's, a Whaler's General Store, and free hula shows on Sundays. Kihei-as dusty, hot, and soaked in aloha ambience then as it is now-was a place to stop at Suda's for gas and a six-pack before hitting up Azeka's for their eponymous kalbi ribs and heading to one of the unspoiled, white-sand beaches for a barbeque and an impromptu game of volleyball. It was an idyllic time, when the slopes of Maui Meadows served as the starting point for skateboarders on their way to the old Kihei Fire Station, Kam III was all of the south side's favorite spot for pau hana, and everyone on the island flocked to the Intercon for fireworks on the Fourth of July. Smitten with the beauty and laidback lifestyle that defines Hawai'i, Brian stayed on Maui for a year, waiting tables at The Sailmaker, working construction, and surfing breaks around the island. When family called him back to the mainland, he was certain he would return—only next time he

they've called Maui home.

vowed he'd bring a partner.

If it's true that the greatest satisfaction is felt in the fulfillment of dreams deferred, then the wait for Brian was well worth-it: Less than two decades later, he and Michelle Turner—a Rocklin, California native who holds a background in finance—came to Maui together to explore the idea of living on its shores. "I'm home," Michelle said the moment they touched down. They were idling on the tarmac, the plane's doors still closed. "She hadn't even smelled the

plumerias yet and she knew she'd arrived," Brian says now from the chic, cozy home the two share on upper Kupulau.

It wasn't the first time Michelle became


instantly love-struck with a place. Determined to find a respite from their demanding lives in Southern California, the pair moved to Baja in the early 2000s when, while driving down the sun-drenched streets of Todos Santos, Michelle declared they were home. For two years, the couple thrived in Mexico, managing an oceanfront property, savoring mile-long beaches radiant with barely trodden golden sand, camping along the coast in their 1972 VW van, and, when there were south swells, surfing on the East Cape near Cabo San Lucas. Brian affectionately became known as "Dog Boy"—a moniker given to him by the locals when a pack of neighborhood dogs began following him as he checked the surf every morning. Michelle was just happy to enjoy the balmy weather and Mexico's mellow vibe. When it was time to move back to the States, she spun a globe to find another zip code with similar latitudes. Florida didn't interest them. San Diego? Too cold. "What about Hawai'i?" she said to Brian, despite the fact that she'd

Those roots have

bloomed: Having called Maui home since 2004, they've built a reputation on the island as arbiters of excellence for their work in the building industry. Brian—a general contractor, former journeyman, and graduate of Orange Coast College—is the driving force behind BY DESIGN Builders, a contracting company that specializes in custom homes and quality renovations. Michelle, who holds a degree in Business Administration from Fullerton College and a certificate in Universal Design from the National

Association of the Remodeling Industry, is an accomplished designer and the founder of Vision Design Kitchen and Bath LLC dba Poggenpohl Hawaii-the oldest, and one of the most prestigious, kitchen brands in the world. The couple, who met through Brian's brother and were married in Wailuku, often collaborate on projects, combining their business acumen, exquisite eye for detail, and extensive knowledge to create strikingly gorgeous remodels worthy of placement in Architectural Digest. Both are keenly interested in



mid-century modern architecture, and, when they lived in California, often made their way up the coast to marvel at San Francisco's stunning structures. Such dedication to their craft has certainly paid off: They have the uncanny ability to envision a fully finished project when it's in its

raw state-and know precisely what needs to be done to get there. In 2013, BY DESIGN was awarded "Best of Remodeling" by Houzz, a leading online platform for residential remodeling and design. It's a testament to the impeccable quality of their work, one that's built on an attentiveness to their clients' desires. an interest in staying as up-to-date as possible through continuing education, and an unwavering sense of integrity.

In the meantime, they're content with the roles they play together and apart on the Valley Isle. A self-described bookworm and information junkie who's known for her wicked sense of humor—a trait undoubtedly passed down to her from her limerick-loving grandfather—Michelle

spends her weekends lingering over coffee, reading the news and watching TED Talks, and taking solo jaunts on Keawakapu. Brian, one of seven children and a Formula 1 racing fan, grabs a board and heads for the surf whenever he has the chance, often driving to the West Side with his 9' Kazuma in search of the perfect swell. When they're not working—both sheepishly but proudly admit that their professions are their passion—they trek to one of their favorite haunts for Happy Hour; Morimoto's, Monkeypod, and Kono's on the Green rank high on their list. As members of the MACC, the music aficionadoswho listen to "classical to pop and almost everything in between"-have relished several concerts on the cultural center's grounds in recent years, including Chaka Khan. Diana Ross, Pink Martini, and Straight No Chaser. At least once a year, they return to the mainland to see family— Michelle's mother, a Shakespeare devotee, resides in Ashland, Oregon, and Brian's two adult daughters from a previous marriage live in Montana and Washington-while every other year they dust off their passports and visit the Poggenpohl corporate headquarters in Northern Germany. In 2015, Poggenpohl sponsored an additional trip to London, where Brian and Michelle had the chance to attend the unveiling of a concept kitchen in Waterloo.

The entrepreneurial pair feel most at home back in their own kitchen, where Michelle often experiments

with new recipes (and Brian, she adds wryly, "doesn't complain.") With its "dolled-up cabinets" and bright light fixtures, it opens into a sleek space that blends comfort with function and offers unforgettable views. "It's the perfect place to live," Brian says of both the island and their home. Michelle agrees: "The energy is great here," she says of Maui Meadows, where they appreciate the seclusion their pikake-spiked sanctuary offers and the small town sensibility of their neighborhood—a place where residents respect one another's privacy but are always looking out for those in their community; just recently, a neighbor left the couple a bag of mangos at their front door. There isn't a globe in sight in their tealwalled living room, but one thing is for sure: Michelle spun it to just the right spot. *

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
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
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The Mysterious and Ancient Lives of Sea Turtles

n the very first day I moved to Maui in October of 1990, I went for a swim in the ocean for a morning workout. During my swim, I noticed a Hawaiian green sea turtle lying on the ocean floor. This was the very first time I had ever been in the ocean on Maui and my first time seeing a sea turtle. I thought to myself, 'Wouldn't it be cool if that turtle came up and checked me out?' About thirty seconds later, she did, and she stayed on the surface with me for quite a while. While she was taking her breaths, she came closer to me and she even circled me a few times. She made immediate eye contact with me and I felt an instant connection. I felt an immediate, ancient presence and wisdom from the turtle. I got chickenskin and I remember thinking, 'Magic happens.' From that day forward, I have snorkeled every morning that weather conditions allow here in Wailea. From my snorkels, I've been able to provide George Balazs,

the head biologist of NOAA in Honolulu, with empirical data for She made immediate eye contact with the last twenty-five years, with more than 41,170 sightings and me and I felt an instant connection. the last twenty-five years, with observations.

At the time, that first turtle that approached me was too young to tell whether it was male or female. It's actually very easy to tell a male from a female sea turtle: when mature, if the sea turtle has a short tail, it's female. If the tail is anywhere from 6-12 inches long, then you are looking at a male sea turtle. I saw that turtle

regularly for many years. Other turtles would swim straight towards me, too. One sea turtle approached me every day on my morning snorkel for five years.

These turtles took me on what I call, 'turtle tours'. I'd get the indication they were going somewhere and wanted me to follow. I would always keep a safe distance but they would swim slowly and stay with me along the coastline and around the reef- sometimes swimming all the way from Ulua Beach to Kea Lani. Scientists know that sea turtles have designated territories but we do not know their typical ranges. Based on these long swims, it's my observation that their ranges are quite extensive. Sometimes I would have swam so far with them I would have to stop and get out of the water so I wouldn't end up too far from home.

Turtles are my specialty but I've had a special connection with other animals as well. Manta rays have come within a foot

of me every time I see them, so close that I could touch them, but of course, I don't. When I first called George Balazs to explain that specific sea turtles would circle or stav near me for long periods of time,

he confirmed that it was really unusual. He inquired if I was wearing a certain colored suit or wearing a certain colognesome type of cue that the sea turtle might have used to identify me- but I don't wear cologne and don't have a specific color that I wear. He was trying to determine a reason for why a sea turtle would spend time each day with the same person. The truth is, the relationship I've had with these turtles exists without scientific explanation. It is silent and on a level that is purely vibrational. Why they seek me out remains a mystery.

In 2002, another female started swimming up and staying on the surface with me for 20-30 minutes. I nicknamed her 'Amazing' because I couldn't figure out what she was doing or why. My relationship with this sea turtle has continued for 14 years and I just saw her this very morning (as I write this). I do not chase her, I do not harass her, and I do not feed her. But, when she sees me on my morning route, she swims right to me.

In 2011, I was bummed because I hadn't seen her for a few weeks. I didn't know if something had happened to her

or where she went. It's a big ocean. Time went by and I had to deal with not seeing my friend anymore.

Five months and four days later during my morning snorkel, a turtle started swimming right at me. I didn't recognize this turtle. Their shells change over time - they get cuts, their shells grow algae—and I noticed a number on this turtle's shell that read 589. I called George and he told me that his team at NOAA had counted and marked all of the nesting sea turtles on the French Frigate Shoals that year. The French Frigate Shoals is a sixty-seven-acre sandy island located roughly 700-1,000 miles Northwest of the main Hawaiian Islands, where 90% of all the Hawaiian green sea turtles are born. When a female green sea turtle is about 25 years old, she returns to the exact same beach that she herself was born to lay her nest. There are no major currents between the main Hawaiian Islands and the Northwest Hawaiian Island chain, so how and why they know to do this is unclear to scientists. Their brains are the size of a pea but I am convinced they are using 100% of it. In the 1970's, NOAA counted just 67 nesting females but that year in 2011, the count of sea turtles was 843 females, with my sea turtle friend numbered among them.

I went out again the next day, and the sea turtle marked 589 joined me on my route. I then recognized her as my

friend, realizing that she had picked me out the day before. Three years later in 2014, she left again. This tells us that this particular turtle went back again after three years to mate and lay another nest. If she leaves again in 2017, then we will know that a pattern is emerging. This time she was gone for 6 months and 15 days from the day she left to the day she returned. And again, I didn't recognize her. She came to me again but this time she was numbered 724.

I believe that the sea turtles are my protectors, my 'aumakua (spiritual guide in the Hawaiian culture). I believe they are also my teachers and that they have ancient wisdom. To me, sea turtles teach and embody three important things: wisdom, longevity, and survival. They have helped me go through everything I've had to overcome here in Maui. They've been on the planet since before the dinosaurs and remarkably, they survived the mass extinction that killed the dinosaurs. Sea turtles are simply not fazed by anything.

When we observe things, we can learn a lot. And so, I observe the sea turtles and how they behave. If you've ever seen a sea turtle underwater, you know that they live peacefully and in balance with nature. They don't bother anyone, gossip or create problems for any other animal. To me, sea turtles are magical creatures and they make me smile, bringing me joy every time I see them. **



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

Pool Equipment Tips & Care

An automatic pool cleaner will dramatically reduce the time spent on weekly maintenance. Pool cleaners have various moving parts that wear out from time to time. If you notice it is not functioning as well, check if there are replacement parts to save from purchasing a new unit. **Filters**

When cleaning cartridge filters, soak them in a cleaning solution for 24 hours, and then hose them off before reinstalling. This can be done 1-2 times before a replacement cartridge is needed. If your sand filter is 3-5 years old, ask your pool professional if it's time to replace the sand. As the sand gets older and clogged with more debris, the pressure will increase. If you notice pressure is still high after backwashing, it is a good indicator that new sand is necessary. To obtain maximum filtration and energy efficiency, backwash or clean your filter regularly, as required. **Gaskets, O-Rings & Rubber Fittings**

These fittings serve as dual-purpose tools. They prevent leaking between joints they secure and prevent air from entering the system. Filter lids and chlorinator lids are the most common to

wear out. Check them regularly and replace as needed.

There are multiple sensors in your heater that are constantly exposed to the pool's water, which cause them to wear out and results in faulty operation. To maintain your heater's efficiency, follow a regular program of preventive maintenance and annual inspection.

PUMPS

If your pump starts running louder or making unusual noises, shut it off and contact your pool professional. Water level is critical in pump life. If water runs low in your pool, it can cause your pump to lose prime and burn out the motor. Ensure baskets in the skimmer and pump are not cracked or broken. Baskets are meant to prevent debris from going through the pump and motor. If you notice any failures in the baskets, replace them immediately. Make a habit of checking and emptying skimmer and pump baskets regularly.

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
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What the Dying Really Regret

've been thinking about death a lot lately. According to hospice chaplain Kerry Egan, the most tragic regret of the dying is that they spent most of their lives hating their bodies. It's the old adage: you don't know what you've got until it's gone.

It's so sad, says Egan, because it is not accidental; it is intentional. They were taught by others-parents, siblings, friends, the culture, and the media—to believe their body was something to be ashamed of. It may have been based on allegedly unattractive features (weight, body hair, shape and size of their noses, eyes, or other body parts) or a deep mistrust of the body instilled from religious beliefs.

Either way, regrets abound about the time wasted hating their

bodiesabusing it or

letting it be abused—until they are close to leaving it.

In some ways it's not surprising. Ours is a culture that starves, diets, purges, binges, and exercises to the point of creating serious health problems, sometimes even causing death. And most of us are at least dissatisfied, and at worst



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hate, some parts of our bodies. This is especially true for women, but men have body image issues too.

In the U.S., at least 5-10 million girls/women and 1 million boys/men are struggling with eating disorders—anorexia nervosa, bulimia nervosa, or binge eating disorder. And the odds of finding a person who doesn't have at least some body image issues are slim to none.

How to turn the self-loathing into self-loving? Like all good and lasting things, it probably won't happen overnight. It begins with small, positive steps. Here are just a few to start

- ☆ Find at least one thing you like about your body. Write it down. Tomorrow, find another. Write it down. Continue.
- ☆ Walk with dignity, hold your head high, thrust back your shoulders, and open your heart area.
- ☆ Using self-talk, take the time to actually, literally tell your

body how much you appreciate

all of its wondrous abilities. Name them one by one.

- ☆ Donate to friends or charity all the clothes you don't like or that make you feel uncomfortable.
- ☆ Challenge the media's definition of what it means to be good looking.
- ☆ Nourish your body with a healthy diet, regular meals, and lots of purified water.
- ☆ Embody your body. Feel yourself breathing from inside your
- ☆ Enjoy your body; not just exercise, but playing, dancing, skipping, stretching, lying in the grass.
- ☆ Pamper yourself with relaxing massages, hot baths, soothing body rituals.
- ☆ Post notes around the house telling yourself how beautiful or handsome vou are.
- ☆ Tell your loved ones how beautiful or handsome they are. By making a conscious choice to love and nurture your body, you can help ensure that when it comes time to say goodbye to it, instead of regrets, you'll be sharing positive memories and gratitude for the wonderful times you've spent together. *

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

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
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The Art of a

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
