The international project was conducted in cooperation with Underwater World Singapore, the Port of Nagoya Public Aquarium in Japan, the National Oceanic Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), and Hawai'i Preparatory Academy.

The preliminary results of the turtles' movements will be presented at the Tenth Meeting of the Convention of the Parties Governing the United Nations Convention on Biological Diversity (COP 10) being held in Nagoya, Japan in October 2010.

Rice also was a guest panelist at a multidisciplinary forum hosted by Underwater World Singapore, "Turtles Toward Extinction: How Late Are We? Is It Too Late?" Professor Peter Ng, director of the Raffles Museum of Biodiversity Research, chaired the forum.
