

DISCOVER AND DEVELOP

(Editor's Note:-The following is taken from an article by Nichols Field Wilson appeared in the May 23, 1947 issue of the Advertures in Business weekly magazine.)

"Dick Curtis, Hollywood's most hissed at villian, raised up from the saddle, gazed at the scenery, and said, 'This is it!'

For Dick, a long search had ended. Here, one hundred and twenty-five miles from Los Angeles was the perfect setting for outdoor, western pictures. He had discovered the ideal blending of mountain and desert at an elevation of 4,000 feet. Within a distance of a few miles he beheld scenery reminiscent of the high flattop mesas of New Mexico and Utah, the Dakota Badlands, the Colorado Rockies, and the runged terrain of Arizona." and the rugged terrain of Arizona."

Dick and a few friends got together and Pioneertown was on its way. Soon land sales were booming and buildings started to dot the area.

Much of the credit for the development of Pioneertown is due the various real estate brokers who worked with Gordon Brown and Bill Dennis of the Pioneertown Land Company. The current four senior brokers, Mac MacKinnon, Nick Treosti, Ken Smith and Don Julio Eisenbruch, head the list of those associated with bringing people to Pioneertown through the land company.






Road to Big Bear **Links Pioneertown**

Pioneertown is located in an ideal position between the famed desert and mountain-lake resorts of Southern California as the map above indicates. When the privately engineered road from Pioneertown through to Big Bear Valley is made ready to facilitate heavy traffic, it is anticipated that thousands of tourists will pass through here going to and from these areas. In effect, the road to Big Bear will link the desert communities with such places as Big Bear and Lake Arrowhead. Men with vision and experience forsee the great possibilities that this link holds for the Pioneertown area, predict a great future as the clogged and smogged metropolitan populations swing in this direction.

The road from Pioneertown to Big Bear passes through some of the most unusual scenic beauty to be found in all the West. Through craggy rock formations the road winds through Burns Canyon and climbs up onto a plateau where some of the largest Joshua trees in the state are found. Among the unusual points of interest along the way is the famed Rose Mine with its "ghost town" and huge shaft building. More than six millions of gold were taken from the mine.




The Harry Althoff family came from the San Fernando Valley to Establish their furniture business here.




