for Traditional Purposes Within Their Traditional Country

CTurtlers- I am grateful to Col Limpus for sharing the following statement with us. Some folks aren't aware of this important point, or they are unclear about it. All indigenous people of Oceania, including here in Hawaii and the USA Territories (Guam, CNMI, & Am. Samoa), should have this same right, as indigenous Australians have, of self-determining traditional use in a self-regulated community manner that strives for sustainability. George Balazs

"In Australia, under native title legislation an indigenous Australian has the right to use natural resources for traditional purposes within their traditional country (land or water). This legislation overrides the commonwealth and State conservation legislation . As a consequence, traditional owners of country do not answer to conservation agencies with respect to the use of wildlife for traditional purposes within their traditional country.

It is therefore inappropriate to imply anything "illegal" with respect to indigenous use of wildlife for traditional purposes within their own country within Australia. And taking wildlife for food and for other customary activities is therefore their right.

"traditional use" is all that is required to define these within Australia.

As I understand it a very similar situation exists within Papua New Guinea."
