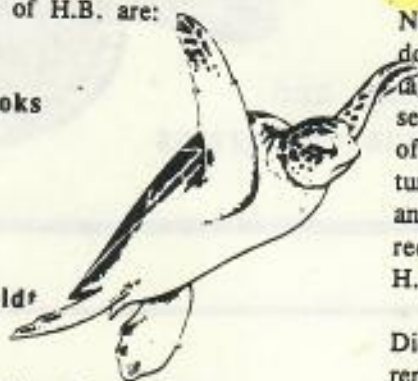
Results of the May 26 Meeting

Hanauma Bay Turtles are Now Wearing Fashionable Turtle Tags!

National Marine Fisheries Service recently came down and tagged five turtles in Hanauma Bay. These tags will help us keep track of the turtles. We can now see which turtles frequent the Bay and the progression of tumor growth on certain turtles. If you see a tagged turtle in Hanauma Bay, come to the Educational Desk and tell us! We would really like to know! N.M.F.S. just recently donated a turtle skull for an educational program. H.B.E.P. is developing on turtle preservation.

Did you know that one turtle with many tumors was removed from Hanauma Bay over a year ago. N.M.F.S. released that turtle in Kaneohe Bay. They thought the turtle would be happier there because it would have an easier time finding seaweed. That turtle wasn't happy in Kaneohe Bay and swam all the way back to Hanauma Bay. It was spotted only a few weeks ago and identified because of its tags!

Did you know the runoff during heavy rains can greatly affect coral reproduction? Corals use chemoreceptors to determine if a substrate is suitable to settle on. If their receptors are all clogged up with pollution, the young coral may not settle to form a new colony and die.
