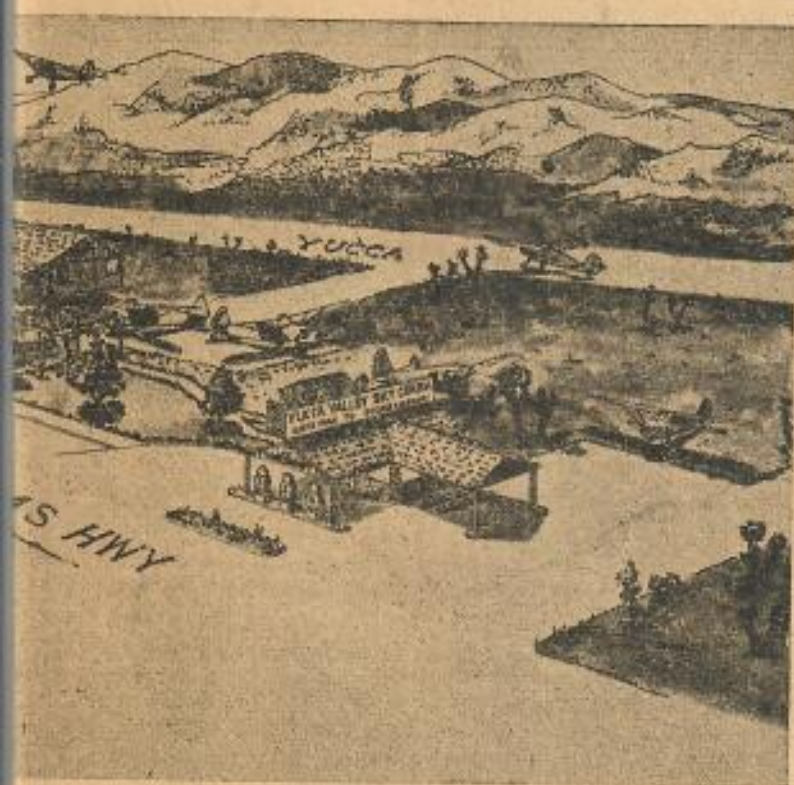

## A Nutraponic Garden In Our Very Midst At Twentynine Palms

TWENTYNINE PALMS, Nov. 12.—Nutraponic gardening is a system of growing vegetables, fruits and flowers without soil. It is a step farther in progress from Hydroponic gardening because it combines chemicals, sand and water.

Last week, a very noted agriculturalist, who is with the United States Department of Agriculture, Mr. F. O. Young, whose home is in Butte City, California, has just returned from a trip to Afghanistan. He was a former associate of Dr. W. F. Gericke, a professor at Berkeley University, some thirty years ago when Hydroponic Gardening was in the experimental stage. Mr. Young was a visitor, last week, at the Nutraponic Gardens, which are being developed by none other than Mr. and Mrs. Bert Coffin, at their home in the Hansen Tract, Twentynine Palms. Mr. Young stated that their plant was one of the finest and most scientifically constructed that he had ever seen.

Actually there are very few places in the world which, like Pioneertown, located at an altitude of 4000 ft., combine all the best features of desert life, plus climatic and geographic differences (the average humidity is below 10%) that make it pleasantly habitable at all seasons of the year. At this altitude of 4000 ft. an unusual blending of desert flora takes place. All the usual desert trees and flowers are profusely in evidence including the Yucca, the Manzanita, Spanish Bayonet and multiple forms of cacti, plus the more hardy types usually associated with higher altitudes such as the Pinon Pine, the Juniper, and the Scrub Oak, Willow, Cottonwood, and other forms of trees. Here the grotesque-armed Joshua grows to majestic proportions accentuating the bizarre charm of this desert favorite.

## Gains in Local Construction Continue

TWENTYNINE PALMS, Nov. 12—"Never backward—ever forward" seems to be the welcome theme-song, so far as local construction activity is concerned. The certainty of this is evidenced in the October report just issued by Deputy County Building Inspector, E. M. Davis.

The inspector's authentic tabulation shows that during October building permits for the Twentynine Palms area were issued for 14 dwellings, totaling in value \$97,642 and four commercial structures valued at \$58,386 thus bringing the total for the month to \$156,028.

## Silver and Lead Assays \$204 Ton In Nat'l Monument

TWENTYNINE PALMS, Nov. 10—It is reported that approximately seven miles south of Twentynine Palms, in the Joshua Tree National Monument, there is a mine from which a specimen containing silver and lead assayed at \$204 per ton. It is also reported that this is only one of many mines in that locality which produces high grade ore, and other minerals.

There is a specimen of this silver and lead on exhibition at the Valley Stores in Morongo, this week only. Next week it will be displayed at a store in Yucca Village, to be announced in the next issue of the Desert Views.

We feel that everyone in the Valley should know what the National Monument can produce in the way of metals for the benefit of our Government. This is in keeping with the plea of President Truman that we create a stockpile of strategic metals.

One thing is certain, that cannot be done, by leaving them in the ground, and that future prospects for peace seem to be getting slimmer and slimmer, and we, of this Valley, must do our part to appeal to—whom?—(not our Congressman Sheppard) but some one in our Government to open up the mines in the National Monument, for we do not want it said, as was during the last war, that we did not do our part in this Valley, and produce the metals which were so badly needed, and which are in his vast storehouse at our back door.

"Seeing is believing." This specimen is only a small one, now displayed at the Valley Stores, but those who doubt this article may contact Phil Sullivan of Twentynine Palms, who has at his place specimens from this same mine, some weighing up to 60 pounds.

It gives us great pleasure to bring before our readers all these facts, in order that we in the Valley will not be blindfolded when the crucial moment comes, and we will be able to produce for our Country the metal it needs from our very own area.

### EDITORIAL

#### OPA SONATA

President Truman slipped one record on the Nation's anti-inflation machine upon assuming office and regardless of cracks, nicks and public disapproval, apparently is determined to re-play his OPA Sonata one more time.

Next attempt at compulsory rationing, according to reports from Washington, will be price control for "just a few" basic commodities. This proposal probably will be submitted to the coming special session of Congress on high prices.

Principal curbs, government officials hint, would be levied against steel, coal and grain, although no specific industries or items have been suggested publicly by Mr. Truman as yet. For the time being, Washington sources report the plan is under serious consideration.

Granted that it is an old American custom to try, try again when the going gets tough, it's also a native habit to try not to make the same mistake twice. The time is due for Mr. Truman and Congress to stop fighting each other and to cooperate in curbing inflation along American lines.

The most notable result of the OPA was the black market. Only high production to fulfill demand can reverse the upward price trend on goods now in short supply and active demand. Government policies should be directed toward stimulating—not stifling—the flow of goods.

#### BETTER HIGHWAYS AHEAD

Bitterest battle of the 1947 session of the State Legislature was the hotly contested increase in the gas tax.

Opponents of the measure contended that the tax hike would curtail gasoline sales, and thus defeat its intended purpose.

But I wanted to go to a native inn, and I wanted to go there the first time because I'd thought of it that way, in a ricksha.

There were still a few rickshas in Japan, but they were fast vanishing. Such of these decrepit unsynchronisms as remained in service were pulled by old men, just as old men drove the last horse-drawn hansom cabs that survived in cities like New York and Montreal.

Younger men drove the taxis. Myriads of Ford, Chevrolet, and Plymouth taxis constantly cruised the streets. It was significant of Japan's vast manpower that there were always two young men to a cab. It was hard to understand with fares so extremely low and gasoline relatively dear, how two men could operate one taxicab profitably.

Perhaps it was that four eyes were better than two to spot a prospect on a crowded street, and two pairs of lungs more effective in persuading a prospect to become a fare.

Or it may have been as I was to find it in China. There, this Japanese-named conveyance, jin-ricki-sha, or, literally, man pulling carriage, has not been outmoded. Owning a ricksha in China, which represented perhaps the price of a bicycle or two, was often beyond the financial abilities of a man without a partner. And in Japan an automobile, with freight and duty added to the Detroit price, represented far more capital than was tied up in the average small Japanese business, so that the investment warranted employment of two operators. Or, it may have been that the government had a hand in taxicab-fleet operation, as it had a hand in virtually every considerable Japanese enterprise. If that were true, this might have been the means of acquainting young Japanese with modern motorears, and of financing the development of gasoline storage and marketing facilities, and of motor repair shops, all against the day of mechanized, internal-combustion-engine-powered war with

while foreigners, especially Americans, and more particularly American sailors, seemed light in being pulled about the leathery-skinned, sinewed, gray-haired "boys." I almost never saw these rickshas. When these passengers were elderly, in conservative dress—representative of Japan that was fast vanishing before their regretful eyes.

Yet visitors, including those who seemed startled by the numbers of the taxis and the fewness of the rickshas, couldn't believe it. This in a rather dangerous lack of information about a highly significant thing in modern Japan. I had it on photographers and writers both amateur and professional. Because every travel picture story, every American movie or photo album

Japan seemed to have one when it was prepared. The "Get a ricksha in it some prominently, as something culturally symbolic—like geisha and blossom festivals—of tinkling temple bells."

The N.Y.K. used "ricksha" in its advertising.

Often I have regretted that Yoshiwara, or red light district, is not considered a fit subject for American newsreels. But not that later.

Anyhow, there'd be little in photographing prosaic taxicabs, the modern department stores, or a typical forced-concrete bridge built by engineers who used American designs. Of course not! Things are not interesting here at home. Photograph instead rickshas, pagodas, geisha, cormorant fishing, tea-houses, sampans, dwarfed red lacquer bridges, sacred and temple gates. The net had been to give eye-n American armchair travelers wholly false impression "colorful Japan" that scarcely existed, an impression pretty general in America, an impression that was partly responsible for the commonly held opinion after Pearl Harbor, that would defeat Japan in

Put chocolate in mixing bowl... pour boiling water gradually over chocolate and stir until melted... COOL... stir flour, sugar, salt, baking powder, and soda into chocolate mixture... DROP in Spry... BEAT 200 strokes (2 minutes by hand or on mixer at low speed). Scrape bowl and spoon or beater... ADD sour milk, vanilla, and eggs and beat 200 strokes (2 minutes on mixer)...

Mix in double boiler: 2 egg whites, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 1 teaspoon light corn syrup, 5 tablespoons water, 1/4 teaspoon salt... Place over rapidly boiling water and beat constantly with rotary egg beater until mixture will hold a peak (7 minutes)... Remove from hot water, add 1 teaspoon vanilla and beat until partly cool... Add 1 cup marshmallows, cut in small pieces, and beat until frosting will again hold up in peaks. Fold in 1 cup nuts.

## Nutraponic Garden

(Continued from page 1)

chemicals used are the six basic elements: nitrogen, potassium, calcium, magnesium, phosphorus and sulphur. As one can see, when vegetables are grown in great quantities nutroponically, (as will be within the next 10 or 15 years as most produce will be grown by soil-less culture) we will then be able to throw away our vitamin pills, as vegetables grown by this system will have a very high vitamin content.

Upon going through the plant at the Coffins, we were told that in the first tank Kentucky Wonder beans, and cucumbers were planted on the 1st of October. On the 3rd day the seeds had broken through the ground and were visible as growing plants. The first buds blossomed on the 20th of October. On November 2, the cucumbers were half an inch long and the beans well on the way to ward development.

In No. 2 tank, 75 tomato plants about 8 inches high were set out on October 18th, and on the 23rd of October, these plants were budding. The buds come in clusters, with as many as 5 clusters to the plant, which will produce from 15 to 25 tomatoes to the plant. Continuance of this rapid growth will assure tomatoes for table use about the first of December.

On October 9, in Tank No. 3, celery, onions, broccoli, Swiss chard and squash seeds were planted. On the 11th day the onions were up, on the 12th, the broccoli and celery, and on the 22nd the Swiss chard and squash were up. On November 1 the squash produced a blossom which opened to 4 inches in diameter. On the 6th of November, enough Swiss chard was garnered to serve eight families.

Tomato seeds planted on October 16 were 14 inches high on November 9 and will be producing fruit by January 15.

With the Nutraponic method, harvest that can be garnered in two months is possible, and, in the meantime, replanting can be done and a continuous production of tomatoes, or any other vegetable, for the market can be had in any month of the year.

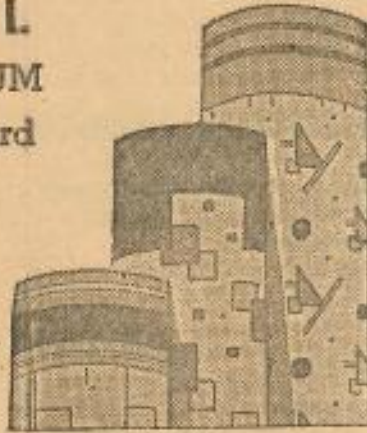

## Aircraft Electrical Installer and Repair Needed—No Exam

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced examinations for probational appointment to positions of Aircraft Electrical Accessories Repairer, Aircraft Electrical Accessories Installer (various grades). These positions are located at Sacramento Air Materiel Area, McClellan Field, California; and McClellan Field, California.

These positions involve the repair, overhaul, adjustment, installation, testing and calibration of all types of Aircraft Electrical accessories. Rates of pay are from \$1.27 per hour to \$1.78 per hour.

Applicants for these positions will be graded by the Civil Service Commission on the basis of length and quality of experience. There will be no written test required.

Present Federal employees holding positions as Aircraft Electrical Accessories Repairers or Installers who desire but do not have permanent civil service status are urged to apply for these examinations. Those who attain eligibility must meet the conditions for classification in their present position. Those who do not have permanent status may have their non-status appointments converted to appointments with civil service status without change in grade or salary. Applicants must be between the ages of 18 and 62, except that these age limits may be waived for veterans, and, under certain conditions, for War Service definite employees. Honorary discharged veterans may have five points added to their ratings and disabled veterans may have additional points.

Further information on examinations and the necessary application forms may be obtained from the Civil Service Examination Station, Post Office Building, 9th and J streets, Sacramento; from the Civil Service Examination Station in this area; and from the Civil Service Examination Station located at McClellan Field, McClellan Field, California.

Applications must be received by the Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners at McClellan Field, California, not later than 10 November 1947.

Why do our residents go to Banning, Riverside, San Bernardino and other cities to shop for groceries, clothing and furniture?

The Chamber of Commerce and other business men's associations should get behind this proposition.

Big Bear is one of the communities that held to the extremely high prices and the last two weeks of the season found that the Motels, Court sand Hotels had 50% more vacancies than they had the year before. The owners of these rentals met and agreed to lower prices the last two weeks and filled up all vacancies, and proved they could have been out of the red if they would have cut prices sooner.

At this time Palm Springs, due to their exorbitant prices, now have 50% more vacancies than they had at this time last year. The merchants of Palm Springs are now going to see what can be done about this deplorable condition. We of Twentynine Palms will have to take into consideration the condition of our own country as a whole and act accordingly.

To feed the hungry overseas, much of the grain formerly consumed in liquid form will go into sacks instead of bottles, into the holds of ships instead of high-ball glasses.

tion them. If these gentlemen are only obeying orders from above, and know they are doing wrong, they can resign, as some of the best men of the Department have already done. If there is a house cleaning in the department, the "acid test" will doubtless be given, the employees, and only those retained who are good Americans, in sympathy with the masses of the people whom they are supposed to serve, then the Department of the Interior will once more have the respect and whole-hearted support of the Nation. It is fortunate we are learning the identity of those responsible for such wicked practices before the next election.

### Monument Supervisor Plays Politics

Many prominent officials were present in the Auditorium, ready with documentary evidence to substantiate the statements of landowners and miners, the manner in which the Monument Supervisor had played politics and tried to juggle the boundaries of the Joshua Tree National Monument to the detriment of claimants. One land owner said that he was told that they intended to force him to give up his holdings because of the water developed. In a very dramatic manner, he asked the Congressman, "Do you want to know who told me that the Government was determined to get my land? Well there he is (pointing over my shoulder to a group of Government men) back of me. His name is James Cole. I dare him to get up, and deny my statements." The former Monument supervisor never moved although several demanded that he should answer. This shows you

Republic in the service of which it had shed blood before the independence of the nation was merely declared.

The Boston Tea Party, which started many Americans to thinking seriously about independence for the first time, was held more than two years before the Marine Corps was founded.

The first battle of the corps which ultimately became the Marine Corps for independence was fought at Concord less than seven months before the leather-collared Marines were organized.

By the time the hastily formed American Naval Expedition was ready to storm the British forts at New Providence in the Bahamas the following year, the Marines were ready for action and had their first dead on a hostile beach.

Five years ago, when recognition was given to the birthday of the Marines, they had gone ashore on Guadalcanal, and the beaches of that festered island were strewn with their dead, and the survivors of the first war were only holding what they had gained because that is the way the Marines keep faith with their dead and their Country.

"They are the toughest, hardest fighting men in the world." The Marines lived up to that expression of faith at Guadalcanal, Tarawa, Saipan, Guam, Iwo Jima and Okinawa and all the blood and vital beaches of the Pacific war.

Every American war has been won in some substantial and crucial part by the United States Marines.

## Re-Selling Veterans Homes

CALIFORNIA DIVISION  
OF REAL ESTATE

The Division of Real Estate has received numerous inquiries from licensees relative to problems encountered in dealing with priority homes originally sold to veteran owners. Since these questions do not ordinarily come within the division's jurisdiction, they should be directed to the Office of the Regional Housing Expediter.

However, through the courtesy of a Los Angeles real estate broker who sent a list of such questions to the Regional Housing Expediter, we herewith quote in part an answer received from the Regional Attorney. This may prove of interest and benefit to brokers, but, in any specific transaction, check carefully for any modifications of rules or policies which may be adopted by the Office of the Regional Housing Expediter.

"As to whether a veteran owner may 'resell his house at any price he wanted to', the rules provide for giving preference at specified maximum sales prices to veterans of World War II in the initial sale and all subsequent sales (except judicial sales)

The seller may not add cost of improvements which has made on the property, either or not they constitute whole or in part, his own unless he has first applied and secured from the Federal Housing Administration a decrease in the maximum price because of such improvements.

The original financing, and escrow charges which customarily borne in the sale may be paid by the original purchaser without violation of minimum price provisions, but may not be passed on to subsequent purchasers as part of purchase price.

The real estate broker's commission may not, as to property constructed under the provisions of PR-33 be added to the maximum sales price provided, however, that if such fees, commissions and charges are to be included in the original sale, it is necessary that such items be enumerated in the application, approved by the Federal Housing Administration. In the event of and subsequent sales, any broker's fees or commissions or other incidental charges paid in connection with the particular current sale may be added to the maximum sales price whether or not such items are enumerated in the application; however, such

commissions or other incidental charges paid in connection with previous sales may not be added.

As to repairs the seller had made while he has owned the house, as distinguished from improvements, neither regulation allows him to add the costs of ordinary maintenance and repair.

As to the interest the seller has paid on his loan against the property while he has owned it, the regulations do not permit the inclusion thereof in the maximum sales price.

If the seller sells a house furnished and where the portion of the price representing the furniture is in excess of the value of the furniture, the rule would be as follows: If the purchase of the furniture were made a condition to the sale of the dwelling, there would be a violation of the maximum sales price limitation under either PR-33 or HEPR-5. If, however, the veteran were given an opportunity to purchase the dwelling without the furniture and the veteran purchased the furniture voluntarily, the purchase of the furniture would be regarded as a separate transaction and would be permissible under either regulation. If the amount paid for the furniture exceeds its reasonable value such transaction, if it meets the attention of the Compliance Division, would be scrutinized with extreme care since, under such circumstances, it would be very likely that the purchase of the furniture was made a condition of the sale of the dwelling.

PR-33 and HEPR-5 are "policed" as you used the term, by the Compliance Division of the Housing Expediter of the Office of the Housing Expediter, 1200 Santee Street, Los Angeles 15 (Prospect 4711).

As to the reporting of sales PR-33 is silent in regard thereto.

However, paragraph (1) (1) of HEPR-5 requires the seller within 30 days after any sale of such dwelling to fill out in triplicate a sales report form (NHA Form 14-39) and file it with the local area rent office of the OPA and, if such accommodations are not in an area under rent control (the seller must send the original and one signed copy of the form to the nearest OPA area rent office).

A real estate broker who figures in a sale or resale of such dwelling at a consideration above the maximum sales price will be covered by the provisions of paragraph (g) of HEPR-5 and probably to an evasion of the rule by paragraph (n) of PR-33 as maximum sales price provisions. Such a violation would subject such broker to the possibility of a criminal prosecution in the federal court and, upon conviction thereof, to either a substantial fine or imprisonment or both.

### Xmas Seal Sale Starts Nov. 24th

Announcing the opening of the annual Christmas seal sale Nov. 24th, Mrs. Bertha Lee, executive secretary of the San Bernardino County Tuberculosis and Health Association, stated that last year there were 137 deaths in San Bernardino County from tuberculosis. It is stated that at this time there are 1150 persons in the county infected with tuberculosis.

In order to prevent the spread of the infection it is important that the disease is found early and when it is more easily cured. With this in mind the San Bernardino County Tuberculosis and Health Association has been engaged in preventing the spread of the disease through the use of the most modern technique of education and case-finding. During the past year over 19,000 persons have had free chest X-rays. The Christmas seal sale is the only appeal for financial support made by the association.

As it is not the policy of the County Tuberculosis Association to build up a reserve the extent of the 1948 program will be dependent upon the success of the current seal sale. Last year the sale totaled \$34,602.19. With the need to extend the program and the addition of study in rheumatism fever and heart disease, it will be necessary to set the goal for the forthcoming Christmas seal sale at \$40,000.

# Yankee Hobo

Its windows reflected the last red rays of a torrid summer sun set.

"No," I told him.

Then I said: "Hoteru? I-i-e Yadoya. Ne-ma. Ichi yen."

That means that I didn't want a hotel. I wanted an inn where a sleeping room would cost one yen.

That word "no," in Japanese sounds a bit like an American slang affirmative. It is written euphonically "ie," but not as a triphthong, in Arthur Rose-Innes' conversation dictionary. Pronounced a little like "Yeah," it is usually accompanied by a wave of the hand, palm sidewise in front of the face. The tempo of the waving, as well as the inflection of the word, is what gives it emphasis.

A Japanese girl whose "ie" could be taken to mean "perhaps if I am persuaded," might flutter her hand daintily and fanlike. At the other extreme, a man confronted by a too-persistent beggar will strike out with his hand as if trying to stun a fly on the wing.

When I said no, I didn't want a hoteru, and put emphasis behind my "no," the Japanese looked startled, but soon trotted off down Bentendori. He turned presently, into a narrower side street. He halted at a little inn just where the retail district ended and a neighborhood of small factories began. For there was no high class hotel and shopping district in Yokohama such as now exist in American cities.

Yadoya, by their nature, are rarely large. The one chosen for me by the ricksha man was a fairly good one by Japanese standards. This was a seaport city, where everything was a little higher-priced than elsewhere, especially when foreigners were the buyers. So a room here cost a yen and a half or 42 cents against one yen, or about 28 cents, that I was customarily to pay each night after I left Yokohama and Tokyo.

At the door I dismissed the

Japanese sat on the floor behind it, reading a Tokyo evening newspaper.

There was no difficulty in making a deal with him for a room. He spoke a little English. Later I learned that this yadoya catered somewhat to frugal or hardup Europeans accustomed to Japanese ways, and who did not like to stay in the "rooms"—like monks' cells in a monastery—of the hoteru-like Y.M.C.A. of Yokohama.

Upon agreeing about a room it was not necessary for the guest to register immediately. In fact it was not even customary; the operation, as I shall be explaining at the end of this chapter, took considerable time. A servant would bring the register to the room. I sat on the polished platform at the entrance, and the removed my shoes, which were placed on the rack by a young woman with an uncanny memory for which shoes were worn when guests went out. She gave me a pair of soft felt slippers, little small for me, except in the toes—for clog-wearing spread the toes of small-footed Japanese. Then she led me down wood corridors with floors varnished, waxed and polished like platform stops. The slippers, in turn, I had to leave outside the door of the sleeping room, which I was to enter in stocking feet. That the rule. Not even slippers were worn inside the ordinary room.

The floor, especially of the room was immaculately clean, and most comfortable to tread. It was covered with finely woven grass matting, springy underfoot. The thin matting is laid over a sewed to more roughly-woven mats of grass and straw a couple of inches thick, which act to muffle sound and as insulation against the cold for sleepers-on-the-floor. And since anything that can be made of straw or wood is cheap in Japan, such mats are within reach of the poorest household. They are uniform as typewritten paper, and room size is described not by dimensions, but by number of mats required to cover the floor. Thus a room may be a "eight-mat room," or a "ten-

 not lie over the ruins of the things that have made America  
 great, but rather by continuous study and strong-hearted  
 labor, building patiently on the work of those who preceded  
 us, where the work is sound, and replacing it where found  
 faulty; replacement to be by methods provided by the Con-  
 stitution. To do this, constant effort must be made to arouse  
 the citizens of the Country to a point where a greater per-  
 centage of them will interest themselves in government, take  
 a part in the councils of their party and go to the polls  
 thoroughly informed on the issue at stake.

Slowly but surely the people of the United States are  
 beginning to realize the priceless value of the Constitution  
 of the United States and the danger of carelessly departing  
 from its spirit and purpose. The study of it in our schools,  
 clubs, civic and commercial associations, forums and churches  
 is worthy of consideration by every person living under the  
 American Flag on American soil.

Professional martyrs, who would awaken our National  
 character and destroy our National ideals, want the field of  
 discussion to themselves. Whenever a loyal American citizen  
 or a Patriotic group moves forward in the teaching of  
 American ideals; arousing interest and love of Country; point-  
 ing out the need of an adequate defense, with compulsory  
 military training; or striving to inculcate in the individual  
 mind a patriotic sense of responsibility, to community, state  
 and nation, the professional martyr and certain groups of self-  
 styled intelligentia throw up their hands and shout aloud  
 "super-patriot!" This is the same group that would use the  
 right of free speech, or free press as a screen to pollute the  
 minds of our young, incite to crime, corrupt public morals and  
 overthrow our Government.

It is a fundamental principle that the freedom of speech  
 which is secured by the Constitution of the United States does  
 not confer an absolute right to speak without responsibility,  
 whatever one may choose, or an unrestricted and unbridled  
 license that gives immunity for every possible use of language  
 and prevents the punishment of those who abuse this free-  
 dom. Freedom of speech does not protect disturbances to the  
 public peace or the attempt to subvert the Government. It  
 does not protect publications or teachings which tend to sub-  
 vert or imperil the Government. In short, this freedom of  
 speech does not deprive a State of the primary and essential  
 right of self-preservation, which, so long as human Govern-

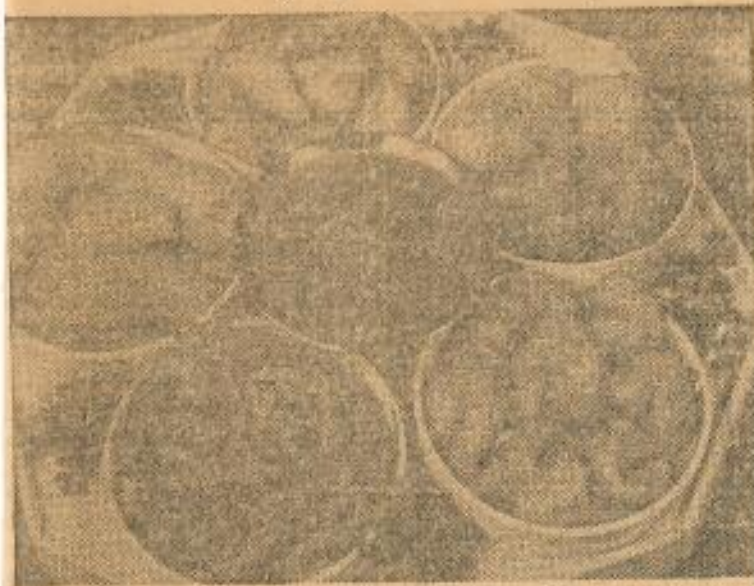

For a fruit batter, combine 1 cup pancake ready-mix with  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup milk, 1 beaten egg and 1 tablespoon sugar. Stir lightly. Dip fruit in batter and fry in hot deep fat 370°F. until golden brown.

#### French Fried Shrimp

Peel raw shrimp; remove black vein, drain and salt well. Dip in batter and fry in hot deep fat about 2 minutes.

#### French Fried Cauliflower

Wash cauliflower and separate into flowers. Boil vigorously for 2 to 3 minutes in salted water. Drain. Dip each flower into batter. Fry in hot deep fat for 2 to 3 minutes.

#### French Fried Eggplant

Peel eggplant. Cut crosswise in  $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch slices. Cut each slice into pie-shaped wedges. Dip in batter. Fry in hot deep fat for 2 $\frac{1}{2}$  to 3 minutes.

#### French Fried Fruit

Dip fruit (pineapple rings, half banana, apricots, peaches or apple slices) in fruit batter and fry in hot deep fat for 1 to 3 minutes.

#### French Fried Onions

Peel medium-sized Bermuda onions and slice crosswise in  $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch slices. Separate rings. Dip in batter and fry in hot deep fat for about 2 minutes.

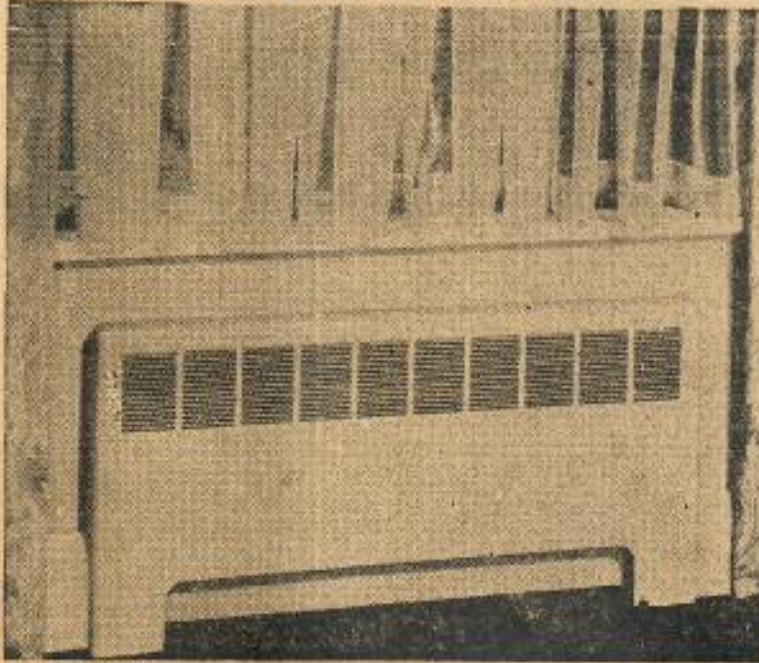

## Recessed Heating Unit Has Clean Modern Lines



New heating units reflect the postwar trend toward styling for beauty and compactness.

Shown in the illustration is a convector for use with hot water and steam heating systems. The new unit has clean, modern lines and may be recessed under windows so that it is entirely unobtrusive yet highly efficient in the distribution of heat.

A convector consists of two basic parts—a heating unit which carries the hot water or steam and transfers its heat to the air and an attractive steel enclosure in which the heating unit is installed.

Hot water or steam circulates through the heating unit and warms the air above it. Being lighter, the warmer air rises in the enclosure and is discharged into the room through the outlet grille. Cooler, heavier air is drawn in through the lower opening of the enclosure, comes in contact with the heating unit where it is heated, rises, and is circulated into the room.

Room air is circulated through convectors on an average of three times per hour. The warm front of the enclosure provides radiant heat directly beneath windows where convectors are usually installed and where radiant heat loss is greatest.

Close temperature control, quick response to the demands of the thermostat, and ease of installation are among the advantages of convectors as distributors of heat.
