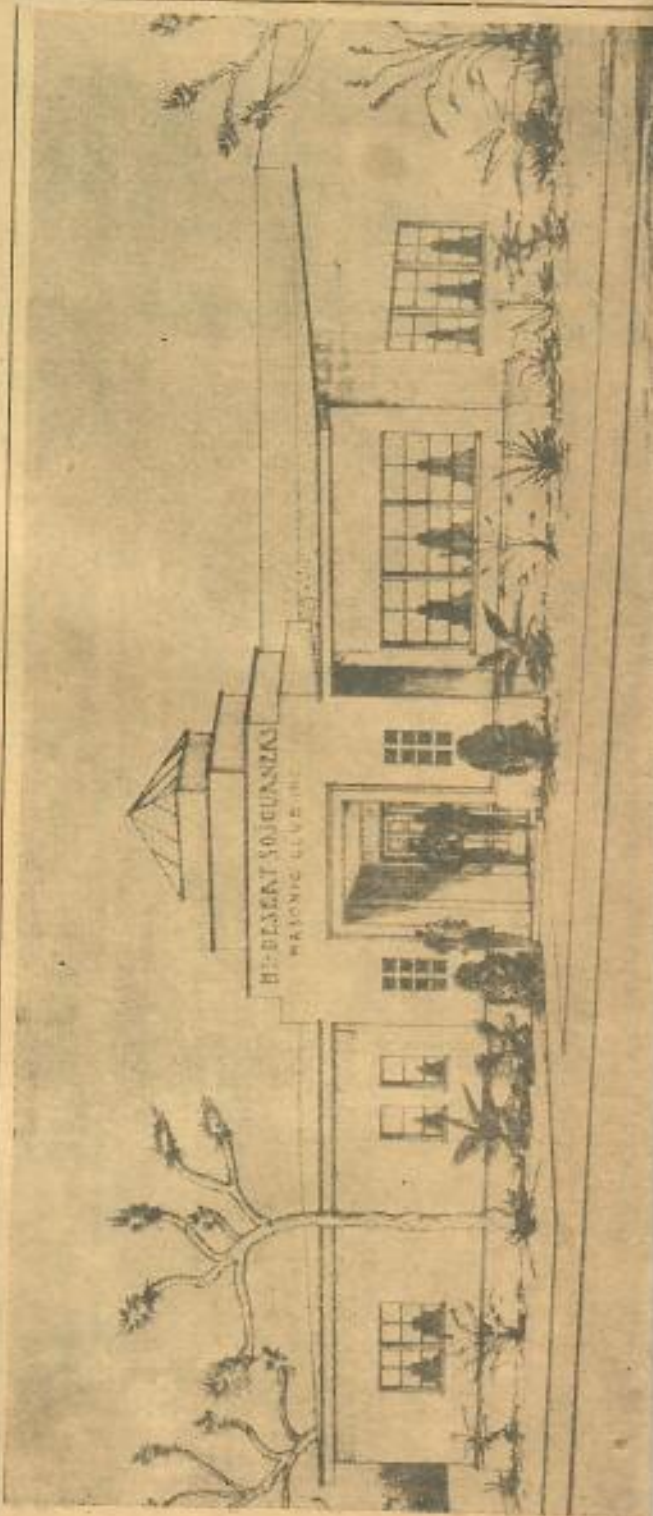

# Masonic Hall Plan Told for Hi-Desert

Taking a long look toward the destiny of the High Desert and its assured place in the sun, a group of Yucca Valley men has put into motion a project which will have a bearing on living values in our spreading area throughout its future.

This group, known as the Hi-Desert Sojourners Masonic club with a nucleus of 65 members, has purchased a tract of two acres from Fred Storey, situated near the northwest intersection of Twentynine Palms highway and Victorville road.

Plans are ready for a clubhouse which will be of especial interest to those of the young generation who are present now in numbers and for succeeding generations of them to follow.

The idea originated in a discussion which took place at the home of F. H. Lafferty in March of 1936, where a few members of the Masonic order were concerned with the lack of a headquarters particularly designed for the activities of the young set and dedicated to their use. The thought took root and grew into the conception of a tract occupied by a well-equipped clubhouse, with the later addition of a Masonic Temple.

So well has the plan gained acceptance that the clubhouse is due to materialize soon in a design prepared by Architect

J. A. Murray A.I.A., who also has preliminary sketches for the Masonic Temple.

The Desert Sojourners, members of the Masonic order of whom there are more in the area, will offer the facilities of this clubhouse to all of the youth groups regardless of other affiliations.

Application has already been made to the DeMolay national offices at Kansas City for establishment of a local chapter for young men within the ages of 14 to 21.

The girls are to be represented in their groups such as Job's Daughters and the Rainbow Assembly Girls and others. Of course, the Order of Eastern Star will be active in its time-honored role as women's Auxiliary of the Masons.

The Sojourners believe that it is high time for the High Desert to have a youth center and are happy in the choice of such an attractive site in a convenient location.

## Record Crowds Expected For Easter Morn

Begin Easter with a "Sunrise" by attending the service in Desert Christ Park with the "Desert Barson", Rev. Eddie Garver and Antone Martin, Sculptor of the statuary.

Record attendance is expected at this years service because of the increasing publicity which has come to the park and the lovely spring weather.

An additional attraction of the Easter Service to many people is the fact that long walks are unnecessary. There are many chairs for those who wish them and the loudspeaker system is such that hundreds of motorists may sit in their cars within easy range of the rostrum — made out of the natural rock in 4-layer tiers.

Above this rostrum, dug in to the hillside, Antone Martin is presently working on the sculpture also made out of natural rock with an angel inside and three women on the outside bearing the spices to anoint Jesus.

These figures are in lifesize dimensions.

The Last Supper which was constructed last year has been completed in bas relief and is 35 feet high and 75 feet long. This is spotlighted at night and is a beautiful piece of work.

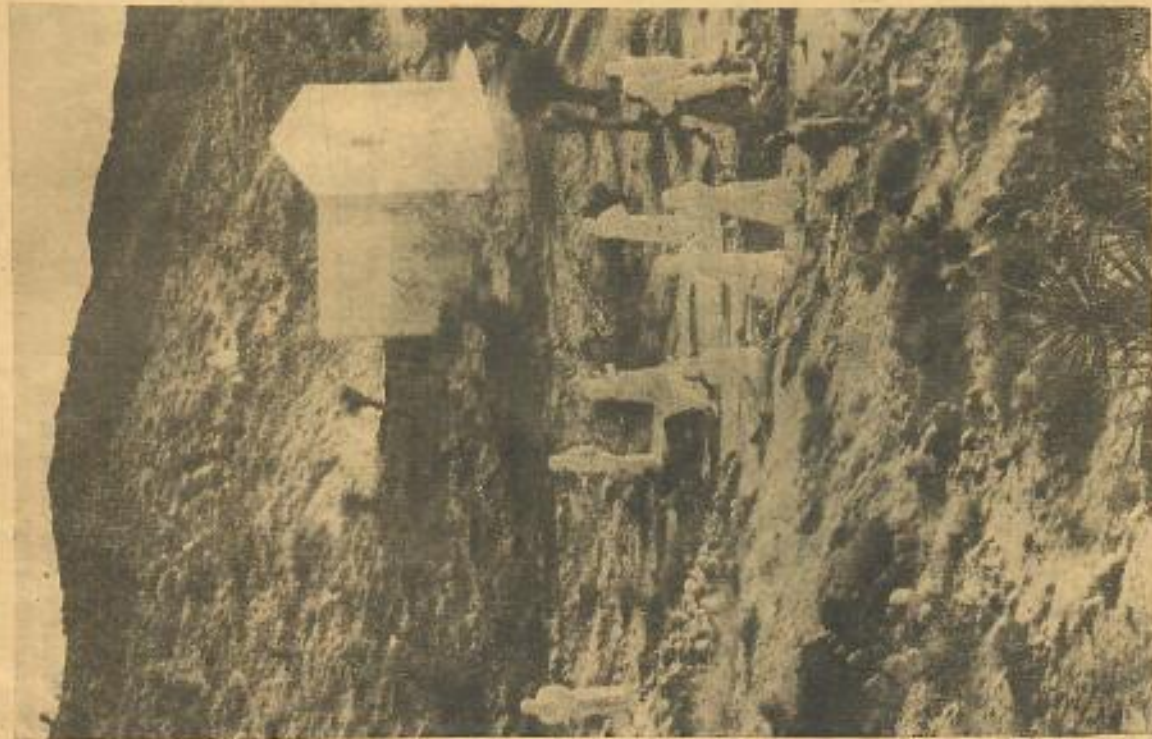

We offer you today, our latest project — A weekly newspaper for the Yucca Valley area. It is not our present intention to go permanently into the newspaper business, but with the co-operation of our business people, residents and property owners and after much investigation, we feel confident that we can carry on until such time as a commercial newspaper may see fit to take over.

The plan under which the paper is organized may be of interest to some and here it is:— The president of the Chamber of Commerce shall appoint a supervising committee of three members, including himself, to appoint a general manager for the project and to confer with the manager and the board of directors of the Chamber on matters of general policy as required.

The manager shall have general supervision of the publication of the paper, arrange for help as required, receive and disburse the funds and otherwise conduct the business of the project. All checks on the newspaper fund shall be signed by the manager and one member of the supervisory committee, or, in the absence of the manager, by any two members of the committee.

The Chamber shall set up an initiatory fund of \$300 to start the project and to prepay the printing of the first issue of the paper. The funds of the project shall be kept in the same depository as the funds of the Chamber of Commerce and be deposited to the credit of the Chamber of Commerce of Yucca Valley, Newspaper Account.

A general reserve fund of \$500.00, inclusive of any residue from the initiatory fund but not inclusive of more than 8 percent of the subscription receipts, shall be built up before any disbursements are made from the fund, other than for actual publication expenses.

Remuneration of the employees of the project shall be determined by the manager, with the approval of a majority of the supervisory committee, except that any manager's salary shall be determined by the supervising committee only.

### Enchanted Yucca Valley

The Valley you hear so much about, a high desert country 3333 feet elevation, all in a forest of Joshua Trees, hemed in by low mountains on three sides, a gorgeous view of Mt. San Geronimo's snow capped peaks most of the year and in the east a view of the rising sun through the Joshua Trees make the most fascinating view to be seen anywhere.

This Valley is one of the most enjoyable and wonderful places to live in to be found anywhere. For health it is superb and unexcelled, high and dry, moderate summer and winter temperature, free from fog and smog and other undesirable features. Our abundance of fresh, pure well water is another feature of our natural heritage.

## YV, Morongo Chambers Join

Law enforcement on the high desert is maintained by the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Office headed by Frank Babd, Sheriff. He has as a branch of his department the sub-station at Twentynine Palms. This sub-station is manned by Sub-Station Commander, Sgt. Don Moyers. He has under his supervision five deputies, one of which is Resident Deputy Reland H. Webb, who resides in Yucca Valley and is on call twenty-four hours a day. He maintains the area of Yucca Valley, Joshua Tree, Pioneertown and Morongo Valley. This area constitutes approximately 640 square miles.

Deputy Webb is responsible for the maintaining of law enforcement and the suppression of crime within this area. Some of the duties of Deputy Webb involve the investigation of criminal acts, public services, coordination of search and rescue, which may involve lost persons on the desert, missing aircraft, etc.

The main object of the resident deputy is crime prevention, and this is obtained by an efficient patrol system. This patrol is focused on the business and residential areas; a patrol is also maintained for the protection of the five acre tracts. Deputy Webb is assisted in these numerous duties by a highly efficient and model Reserve Unit, thoroughly trained in the mechanics of modern law enforcement.

This unit consists of nine men who live in the four high desert communities; Yucca Valley: James O'Connor, George Balazs, David Hansen, Ernest Peters, Joel Hammett, Roger Melanson, and Larry Gray. Morongo Valley: Harold Ragby. Pioneertown: Howard "Red" Davidson.

## Police Stop Man With Gun Headed For YV

Police efforts to get a burglary complaint against the 33-year-old service station attendant arrested en route to kill his wife and her alleged lover with bullets on which he had scratched their names failed last week when his employer refused to prosecute.

Wayne L. Schofield of 6206 Tipton Way was caught speeding through Glendora at 90 m.p.h. early Tuesday. He was quoted as admitting that he took \$171.81 from the station at 6174 York Blvd. in which he worked.

He also was quoted as saying he was headed for Yucca Valley to shoot his wife Dorothy and a man named Tom.

Glendora police turned Schofield over to Highland Park officers and he was booked at Central Jail on suspicion of burglary.

But when Schofield's boss declined to prosecute, the District Attorney's office refused to issue the complaint.

He will be arraigned this week in Citrus Municipal Court on suspicion of carrying a concealed weapon.

Schofield said his wife left him and their four children about a week ago and he since learned she and "Tom" were in Yucca Valley.
