

Big Land Sale Revealed

**673 ACRES
BOUGHT BY
OMAHA FIRM**

A real estate sale amounting to nearly a quarter of a million dollars was revealed this week by broker George Balazs, who said the transaction was the largest ever handled through the high desert offices of the Tri-Valley Escrow Co.

Balazs, who acted as agent for both parties, told the Hi-Desert Star the sale, of Sec. 9, T1S, R6E, San Bernardino County, was started July 14 and finally closed Aug. 21.

The big section, composed of 673 acres, was purchased by Plains States Co., a Nebraska corporation, owned by Dr. and Mrs. J. F. Gardiner of Omaha.

Vern F. Crofton, of Topanga Canyon, sold the property. A telegram to the Hi-Desert Star signed by Mrs. Gardiner confirmed the purchase but did not give any details concerning the use to which the land will be put.

Balazs did not divulge the amount of the sale. But he said that "close to a quarter of a million dollars" described it satisfactorily.

Requests for the establishment of kindergarten classes at the new Joshua Tree Elementary School were denied Sept. 13 by the board of education, which declared the lack of pupils and the expense involved made the proposal unfeasible at this time.

The question came up at the regular board meeting last Monday when residents of Joshua Tree objected to the district transporting children of kindergarten age to Yucca Valley for the afternoon kindergarten session.

Mail Run Commemorated

Centennial Caravan To Publicize YV

Buck Brown left town this week to join the Butterfield Stage Centennial caravan, as part of a plan by several Yucca Valley businessmen to publicize the community and help promote the sale of "hospital" house memberships to the chamber of commerce.

Scheduled to leave last Thursday, "Buck" and his oxen had trouble with the horses under the hood of his truck and had to return for repairs. At press time, Brown was scheduled to pick up the caravan at Durant, Okla.

The centennial celebrates a record mail run 100 years ago when the Butterfield Stage carried the mail from St. Louis to San Francisco. A commemorative stamp is to be issued in San Francisco Oct. 10, the day

the modern caravan completes its trip over the historic route.

Only 100,000 stamps are being issued. Anyone wishing to have a letter stamped with this issue should give an unstamped envelope, marked with return address, to Ken Bonser, who will forward it to Brown in San Francisco.

In San Francisco, the special stamp will be affixed; then the letters will be sent to St. Louis for postmarking. The government will attempt to set an all-time record from St. Louis to San Francisco on the date of the mail-by-stage record.

Buck's wagon, which will travel across country with the caravan, will have banners advertising Yucca Valley, post cards, chamber of commerce literature and other promotional material. Go to it, Buck!

Phone Numbers To Be Changed

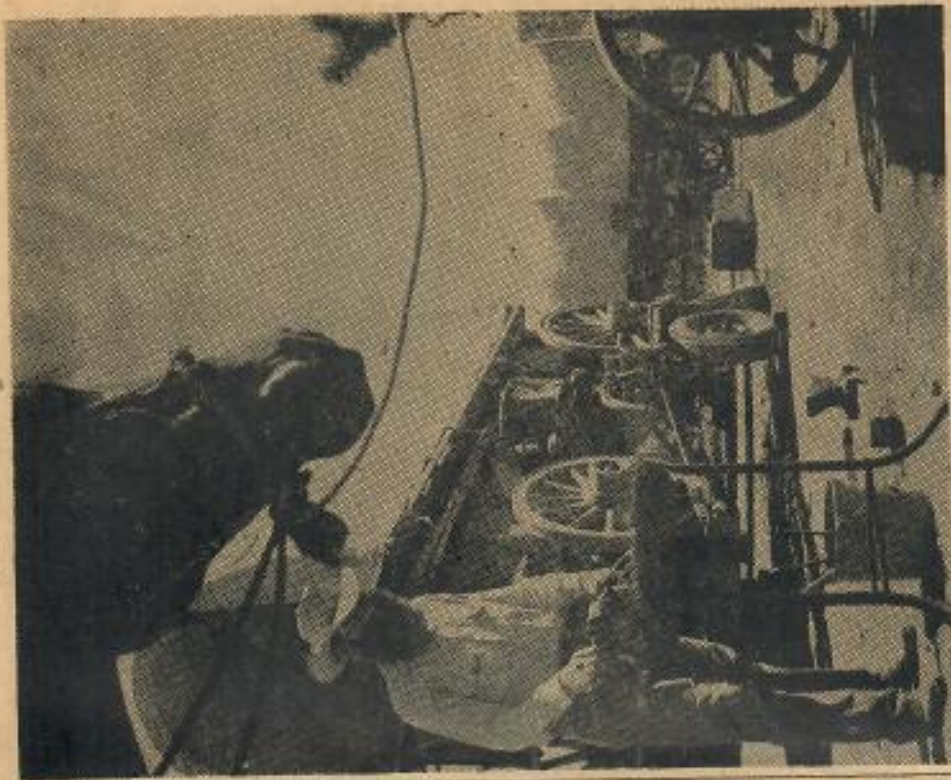

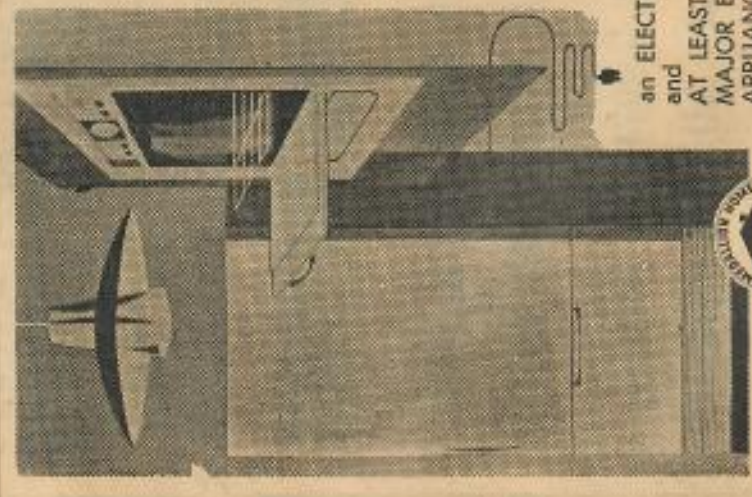

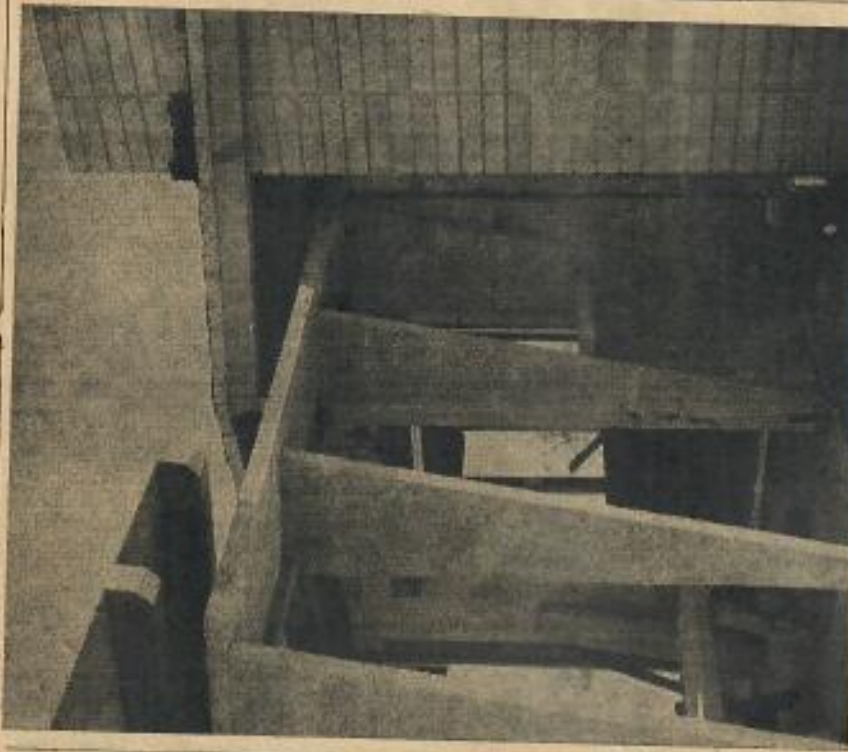

The association said vehicles most needing inspection can "easily use the Dale Dry Lake Road and Twentynine Palms highway and avoid inspection." The association proposed the station be built in Sheephole Pass where "everyone must pass."

Dear Parents:
