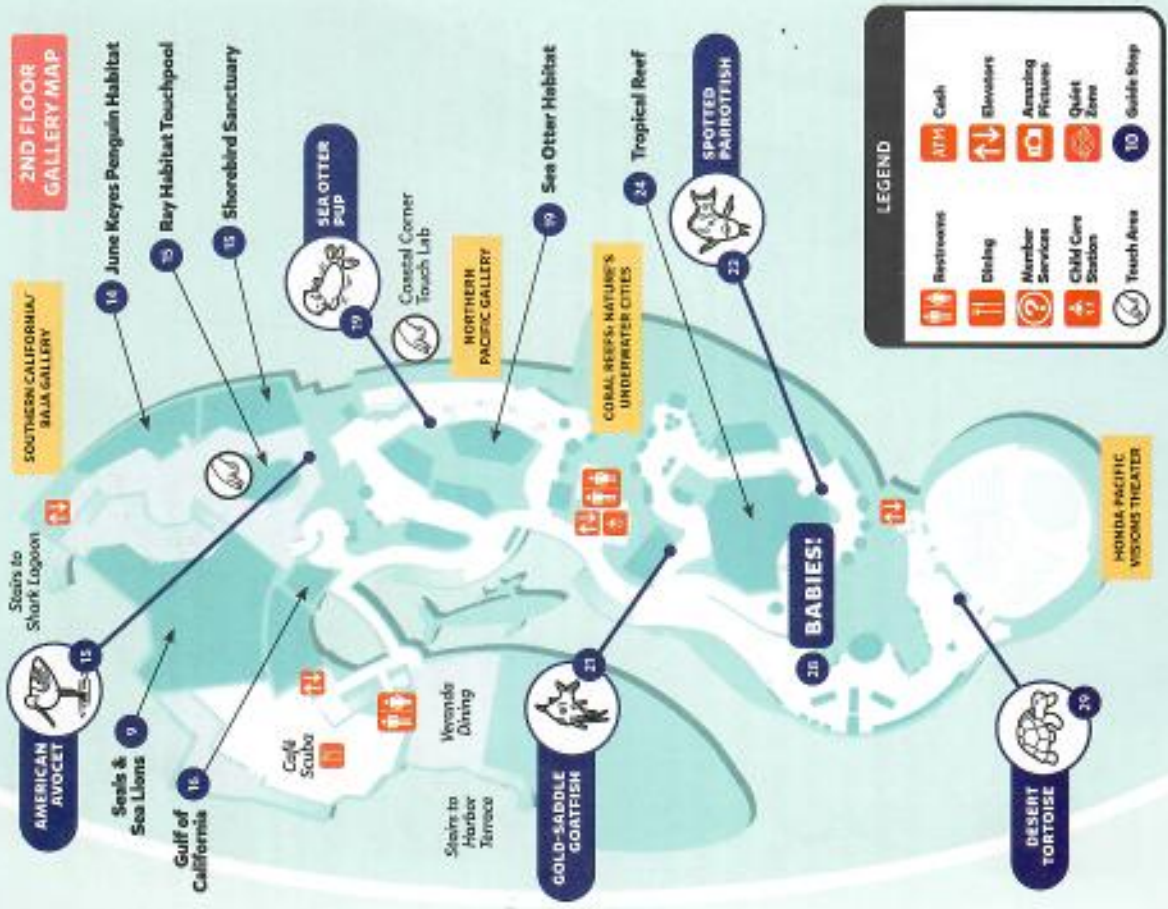

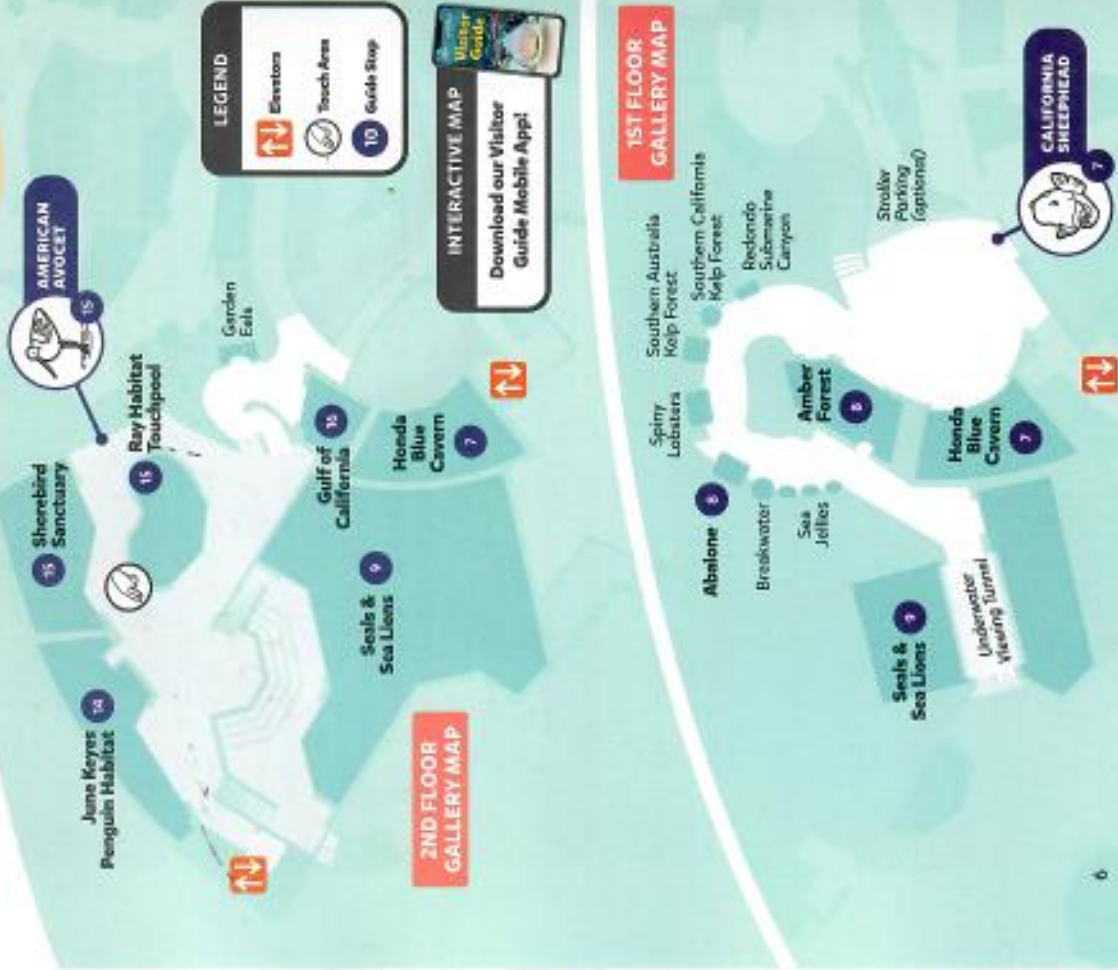

YUTAKA

Look for our young giant sea bass, Yutaka, and compare this fish's size to its adult parents in the Honda Blue Cavern exhibit. Yutaka was the first giant sea bass to be successfully hatched and raised under human care. As a result, the Aquarium was part of an effort to raise these endangered fish, release them into the ocean, and track their movements.

The Aquarium has a behind-the-scenes abalone lab where red and white abalone are raised. Along with other aquariums and labs, we are breeding endangered white abalone and releasing them off the coast of Southern California to help this species avoid extinction.

ARTIFICIAL INSEMINATION

This can help make keeping sharks at aquariums more sustainable and has applications for increasing shark populations in the ocean. Fern, our female zebra shark, has successfully produced offspring via artificial insemination.

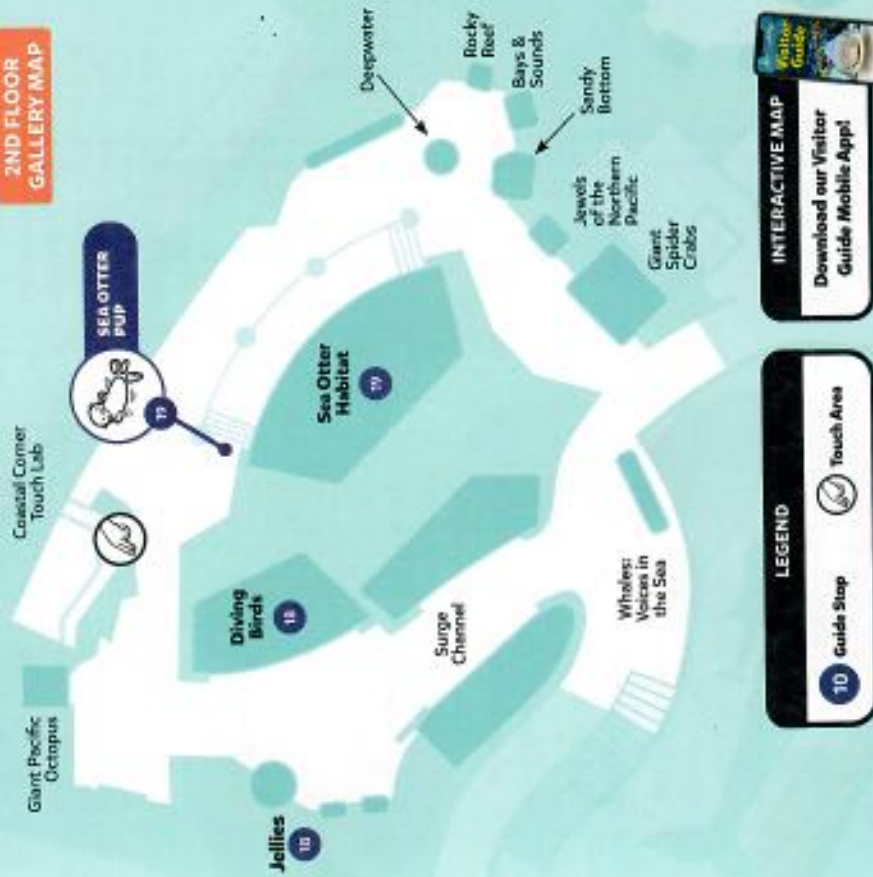


Northern Pacific Gallery

Sea Otter Habitat 10

THE SOUTHERN SEA OTTER is found along the California coast from Monterey Bay to Point Conception, just north of Gaviota State Beach.



SEA OTTER CONSERVATION

Southern sea otters are a **protected species** in California. They were hunted to near extinction in the 1900s and still face threats including oil spills, pollution, and climate change.



SEA OTTER SURROGACY

The Aquarium of the Pacific is working with the Monterey Bay Aquarium to help care for orphaned sea otter pups. Our adult sea otters will serve as surrogate mothers, teaching the pups how to eat, groom, and survive, so that they can be released back into the wild.

Sea otter pups can be separated from their mothers in strong currents or if the mother is injured. After being rescued, some pups are able to return to the ocean after learning key survival skills from a surrogate sea otter mother.

CORAL REEFS are among the ocean's most diverse ecosystems. They are home to a quarter of all ocean fish species and are found throughout the world. Explore coral reefs in the Tropical Pacific Gallery to learn what is being done and what you can do to help them survive and thrive in a changing ocean.

BETWEEN THE SHORE and the outer barrier reef, coral lagoons provide protected areas to serve as nurseries for young fish. In these shallow waters, fish can hatch and grow while safe from predators.

BEHIND THE SCENES

MOUNTAIN YELLOW-LEGGED FROGS

The Aquarium is caring for critically endangered mountain yellow-legged frogs behind the scenes. With only seven small populations remaining, our rescued tadpoles could be essential to this species' survival if we can use them to establish new populations in California's mountain ranges.

Coral Predators 23

ANIMALS THAT EAT CORAL play an important role. Crown of thorns sea stars, some sea slugs, and parrotfish, like the ones in this exhibit, feed on coral and algae. They keep the reef healthy by eating sick and dead coral, sediment, and overgrowth.

SOME CORALS ABSORB blue and ultraviolet light and then emit lower-energy fluorescent light. The reason why is still a mystery, but fluorescence is a sign that corals are healthy. The color shift might work like sunscreen to protect the delicate corals in shallow waters from intense tropical sunlight.

Parrotfish use their large, sharp beaks to scrape off pieces of coral and eat the algae that lives in the coral's tissues as well as the coral's calcium carbonate skeleton. Through this process, parrotfish and other species that eat coral help to control coral growth.

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THE TROPICAL REEF HABITAT is the Aquarium's largest exhibit, containing 350,000 gallons of saltwater. This exhibit features hundreds of colorful fish, rays, sea turtles, and zebra sharks that live among the beautiful artificial coral.

SEA TURTLE RESCUE PROGRAM

The Aquarium's veterinary staff has rehabilitated rescued sea turtles for nearly two decades, often performing surgeries to treat injuries. Once deemed healthy, these sea turtles are released in nearby ocean waters.

DISCOVER THE KEY to our future as you learn about our baby animals and their fascinating behavior and biology, how we care for them, threats to their survival, and what their future means for their species and our ocean planet.



JELLY LAB

See how we culture baby sea jellies at the jelly lab. Discover the early stages of their life cycle. Most sea jelly larvae settle on hard surfaces, turn into a polyp, and eventually release tiny jellies.



SHARK BABIES

Meet our juvenile bamboo and epaulette sharks and see shark eggs collected at the Aquarium of the Pacific. Learn about the Aquarium's research on shark artificial insemination and how it benefits the environment. The Aquarium of the Pacific was the first public aquarium to successfully breed a large shark species through artificial insemination in 2014.

The desert tortoise, California's state reptile, has adapted to conserve energy and water to survive its hot, dry habitat. Their shells are soft when they are babies and harden slowly after a few years.



ADULTS & BABIES

Some ocean babies look quite different from their adult parents, while others look like miniature versions of adults, like the Banggai cardinalfish on view in the Babies' exhibit.

OCEAN NURSERIES

Some ocean habitats serve as nurseries for baby animals by providing protection from predators and rough seas. Explore exhibits that represent ocean nurseries, including mangroves, coral reefs, and seagrass beds, and meet the babies that grow up there.

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What You Can Do

WHEN ANIMALS ARE BABIES, they are in a particularly sensitive time of life. It is important we protect baby animals and their habitats to ensure they survive into the future and maintain biodiversity.



TREAD LIGHTLY

Having an awareness about the habitats you are visiting when you spend time outdoors can help protect baby animals. Always follow guidance from posted signs, rangers, and lifeguards and stay on marked paths or trails. Beaches and dunes may be nesting grounds for birds or sea turtles. Step carefully and stay away from nests.



PROTECT OUR WATERWAYS

Pollution in our rivers, streams, and oceans threatens baby animals, from fish eggs to seal pups. Participate in clean-ups and pick up your trash when outdoors. If you can, reduce your use of single-use plastic products and packaging. Be sure to keep harmful materials from washing into storm drains and choose home cleaning and personal care products that are less harmful. Practice water conservation at home, particularly in your garden. A grass lawn can consume up to 70 percent of residential water use.



SAFE TRAVELS

Check that tour operators you use on vacations practice environmental and ocean stewardship.



SLOW CLIMATE CHANGE

Greenhouse gases and carbon dioxide emissions are causing deadly ocean heatwaves and acidifying the ocean to such an extent that corals and shellfish have a hard time building their skeletons. The consequences can be massive die-offs, loss of reefs, loss of food supplies, and shifting species ranges. Reduce your emissions by walking, biking, carpooling, and using public transit; composting your food waste; and making your home energy efficient.



LEAVE THEM BE

Keep your distance from wild animals. Human activity can scare some animal parents away from their young. Touching wild animals can spread disease. Desert tortoise populations, for example, are shrinking in part because people take the babies for pets. Instead, enjoy wild animals from a distance, and get an up-close experience at your local zoo or aquarium.
