

Wendy and I became friends through this work and I could always count on her help

Wendy was a terrific person, both as a youngster and as she aged. We were blessed to know her and to love her.





Wendy was such a special friend to myself and my daughters.. The world was a better place with her in it. Gone way too soon. I feel so blessed to have known her.





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

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
