Investigating the impact of climate change on the ecology of loggerhead turtles: Transmitters attached to turtles to be released into the sea Nagoya Port Public Aguarium

To investigate the impact of climate change on the ecology of loggerhead turtles, Nagoya Port Public Aquarium installed transmitters on turtles to be released into the sea. Nagoya Port Public Aquarium is working with research institutes in the United States and other countries to investigate how climate change is affecting the swimming routes of loggerhead turtles in the sea, aiming to more effectively protect the endangered loggerhead turtles. 28 loggerhead turtles are scheduled to be released in the central North Pacific Ocean in July, and on the 18th, transmitters were installed at the aquarium's research facility to transmit location information. "This survey will reveal new migration routes. We hope that we will be able to develop concrete measures that will be useful for protecting loggerhead turtles at their destinations, and that the results will provide material for such measures." (Masanori Mori, Sea Turtle Specialist at Nagoya Port Public Aquarium) The 28 turtles will be tracked using transmitters for about 400 days as they swim.
