Punalu'u In Ka'u on the Island of Hawai'i- Looking Back:

Most folks familiar with the honu of Hawaii know that the systematic nighttime monitoring of nesting at Lalo (French Frigate Shoals) started in June of 1973 and continued consistently for several decades. In the process over time, consensus was gained for the State of Hawaii to ban commercial harvest of honu and enhance the enrichment of conservation awareness by the millions of tourists annually visiting Hawaii. What most folks are far less familiar with is the importance of monitoring honu in their oceanhome foraging range at the culturally special place of Punalu'u in the Ka'u District of Hawai'i Island. Punalu'u is one of a great many honu foraging locations in the Main Hawaiian Islands. The Punalu'u historical initiative was made possible by the outstanding cordial cooperation of the Marine Option Program of the University of Hawaii at Hilo (Drs. Dudley, Hallacher, John Coney & others), the Hawaii Institute of Marine Biology (UH's HIMB at Coconut Island Moku o Lo'e in Kaneohe Bay), and the UH Sea Grant College Program under the directorship of Dr. Jack Davidson. Looking back over the years, as I am doing at this moment, the start and consistent continuation of periodic study visits to Punalu'u was truly the counterpart companion of monitoring nesting at French Frigate Shoals. I think it's important to recall this point when the history books are written, as they will be, telling about Westernstyle studies, partnerships, policies, and cultural traditions of Hawaii's honu. For those reasons, and others, I've scanned many hundreds of pages of personal documents of all sorts saved over the decades. 

Looking Forward- Where to See Hawaiian Honu'ea Hawksbills Easy and For Free:

Honokohau Harbor Hotspot for Hawaiian Hawksbills Honu'ea (HHHHHH). **Yes**, in Honokohau Small Boat Harbor, the famous marina on the Kona Coast of Hawai'i Island. Known for decades as a refuge for numerous green turtles, the harbor's unique habitat (created by clearing solid lava rock inland instead of building breakwaters seaward) is now also regularly frequented by honu'ea, Hawaiian hawksbills of several sizes. All seem healthy and happy living life at this special sheltered location. All boaters of the harbor know about the sea turtles taking care to protect them. Note- parking is free at the harbor and the walkways are open for strolling to view turtles. Please give boat owners and their guests right-of-way, along with a warm cheerful smile and greeting of Aloha.


